Environment Wales Act 2016 Section 6

1. Introduction

Community & Town Councils are required under the Environment Wales Act 2016 Section 6 to prepare and publish a plan setting out what it proposes to do to comply with the duty to Maintain and Enhance Biodiversity within their current work areas.

Public authorities must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the exercise of functions in relation to Wales, and in so doing promote the resilience of ecosystems, so far as consistent with the proper exercise of those functions.

This plan demonstrates Duhonw Community Council's commitment to and responsibility for complying with the duty.

2. Duhonw

Duhonw Community Council was created following a 1985 review by the Local Government Boundary Commission for Wales, amalgamating the four small communities of Llanddewi'r Cwm, Llangynog, Llanynis and Maesmynis. It lies to the south of Builth Wells. The Community Council area covers 4375.74 hectares and, at the 2011 census had a population of 294 people. It thus has a population density of 0.1 person per hectare.

The Church Hall is an important community facility.

3. Wildlife and Biodiversity

Duhonw Community Council area sits within the Epynt, Natural Landscape Area (NLCA 28). The Sennybridge Military Ranges make up a large part of this area and are off limits to the public, except via The Epynt Way Trail. They are a SSSI.

The Epynt Ranges are important for grassland wax cap fungi. They support mammals such as hares and birds such as Red Kite. Elsewhere in the Community Council area includes woodlands important for speciaes such as wood warbler and pied flycatcher.
